ACLU Releases Blueprint for Smart Justice

Recently, the ACLU released the <u>Vermont Blueprint for Smart Justice</u>, which offers a list of policy options for continued reform efforts, including drug decriminalization, expanding alternatives to incarceration, investing in treatment for mental health and substance-use conditions, and reforms in Vermont's bail, sentencing, and parole systems. It also highlights the lack of readily accessible criminal justice data in Vermont, and that this serves as a major barrier to addressing racial and geographic disparities.

New York Times reporters Jodi Kantor and Megan Twohey detailed the obstacles they overcame in their reporting of the Harvey Weinstein sexual abuse story during an appearance at the University of Vermont as part of the Vermont Women's Fund's annual fundraiser. What does equity look like? | Su White on Building Bright Futures' Blog
