Health Disparities Faced by Transgender Youth

The Vermont Department of Health recently released a <u>data brief on health</u> disparities faced by transgender youth in Vermont.

Vermont lawmakers urged to ban female genital mutilation | VTDigger

"Judge Bernard Friedman, who sits on the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Michigan, ruled in 2018 that the federal law enacted in 1996 banning female genital mutilation was unconsitutional because Congress did not have the authority to pass it. Because genital mutilation is considered a "local criminal activity," the procedure should be regulated by states, Friedman determined.

Which is why state legislators need to act urgently, said Liz Yore, the head of EndFGMToday, an organization that aims to end female genital mutilation in the US. Yore said she is worried that states like Vermont that don't have protections could provide an open legal window for procedures to take place. But like other illicit markets, it's hard to tell for sure how often this loophole may be exploited."

Chelsea Henderson: Beyond Tolerance to Empathy | VTDigger

"One thing is clear to me: Tolerance was never the goal. The true aim is empathy, recognizing the humanity and dignity in each individual. Pronouns are such a small step in that direction; just a token of recognition that means the world to the youth

who are most deeply impacted by an experience of gender that so many are able to take for granted. I'd hope we can all agree that we want all Vermont youth to feel important and valued at school. Using correct pronouns says to a youth: I hear you. It says: You are valued here." Read more.

Chittenden County Diaper Bank Receives Donation of 255,000 Diapers

The <u>Junior League of Champlain Valley (JLCV) Diaper Bank</u> kicked off National Diaper Need Awareness Week by <u>announcing the donation made by the National Diaper Bank Network</u> (NDBN) and its founding sponsor Huggies. The JLCV Diaper Bank provides roughly 100,000 free diapers annually to children and families served by area food shelves.

Burlington Early Learning Initiative (ELI)

Through grants and customized support for childcare programs, <u>Burlington's initiative</u> has created 85 new high-quality childcare slots (70 for infants and toddlers). In August, a scholarship program for low-income families began, helping 15 children ages birth to three access high-quality childcare for the first time.

Tiff Bluemle: A Drive for Diversity Starts with Data

"Collecting and publishing data makes a statement – about what we value, who is visible, and the priorities that drive our decision-making. If we're serious about attracting and nurturing diversity, we've got to stop wringing our hands about the limits of the Census and pursue and make public the data that public and private organizations can collect. To compete for talent, companies like Buffer now publish corporate diversity stats on their websites. The City of Boston built and maintains a public dashboard that reports on employee diversity. In 2011, the state of New York committed to increasing the percentage of state contracts with women- and minority-owned businesses, which at the time was about 10%. By 2018, that percentage had nearly tripled to 29%. We could be doing these things, too."
