

On Thursday evening, September 27th from 6:00 – 7:30 p.m. at St. Albans City Hall, the Commission hosts "Economic Challenges in Franklin County: Listening Project Forum." Kicking off the conversation, local experts from Let's Grow Kids, Main Street Alliance Vermont, Community College of Vermont, Northwestern Counseling & Support Services, and RiseVT address conditions for women and girls in Franklin County. The focus then switches to audience participation and discussion, where area residents share their experience, learn from others, and help shape the work of the Commission.



These events are part of the Commission's Listening Project, a statewide survey asking what needs aren't being met for Vermont women, what most affects their ability to provide for themselves or their families, and how the Commission can support efforts to improve the economic well-being of women in our state. Senator Leahy's free 22nd Annual Women's Economic Opportunity Conference (WEOC) will be held Saturday, October 13, at Vermont Technical College in Randolph.

Registration is now open, with nearly two dozen workshops (including one presented by VCW Commissioner Lisa Senecal) appealing to a wide range of interests and skills. **The registration deadline is October 5.** Based on feedback from last year's conference, the Senator will again partner with Change The Story VT, our initiative with Vermont Works for Women and the Vermont Women's Fund to promote economic security and equality for all women in our state. After a decade of growing her company, Corinne was recently named to Forbes' 30 Under 30 list, which recognizes "the best young makers and industrial innovators" in the country. And she has used her success to help others, donating hats to cancer patients around the country through her Skida + 1 program. She is an inspiring entrepreneur. NewStory launches "Turning the Page" program

The NewStory Center in Rutland received a grant this April for almost \$30,000 from the Vermont Women's Fund and Vermont Community Foundation to pilot a program called "Turning the Page." The program will help female survivors, ages 18-24, find work, skills training and internship opportunities with local companies to keep them moving on the road to a healthy and independent life. Participants will job shadow for 10-20 hours a week for three to six months and receive a small monthly stipend and have access to resources that will help them professionally. Read more.

Report released by the National Partnership for Women & Families gives Vermont a grade of "B" for providing basic workplace protections

The new report analyzes state laws and regulations governing paid and unpaid leave in the United States and assigns grades to 50 states and the District of Columbia. Half the states got a "D" or "F." The study determined that those states are doing little or nothing beyond what federal law requires to ensure that workers don't have to risk their pay or their jobs when they need time off to care for a new child or a sick family member, recover from illness, or seek health care services. "Perhaps the issue can best be summed up by Ash Williams, North Carolina organizer for SisterSong, a southern based, national membership organization whose mission is to

Vermont assigned "D" Grade & ranked 34th by Represent Women's Gender Parity Index

Vermont is the only state to have never sent a woman to Congress, has only had one woman governor, and currently, Vermont's only elected female statewide executive officer is Treasurer Beth Pearce. 39% of seats in Vermont's state legislature are held by women, and only one Vermont's five largest cities has an elected female executive. address the critical shortage of highquality child care in Vermont through a second round of Make Way for Kids (MWFK) Grants. These funds will be used for construction, capital improvements and program changes that result in increased capacity; workforce development efforts; and equipment and materials needed to enrich early learning environments and the well-being of children served in newly created child care slots. Family child care (home-based) programs can apply for up to \$10,000. Applicants from child care centers, schools, businesses, municipalities and other agencies may apply for funds up to \$30,000. Those interested in applying for a Make Way for Kids grant must first attend a MWFK informational call for grant applicants (1-802-448-4854) on October 2 at 6 PM. COMING HOME film Premiere

Bess O'Brien's latest film, COMING HOME is a documentary film focused on five people returning back to their Vermont communities from prison. The film focuses on the innovative COSA program (Circle of Support and Accountability) that helps reintegrate folks back into their daily lives. The COSA program is run through Vermont's Community Justice Centers and is part of the restorative justice model. COSA's are made up of community volunteers who meet once a week with offenders returning back to their towns and cities. COMING HOME takes an intimate and powerful look at this COSA process, the struggles and challenges of folks coming out of prison and the successes of the restorative justice model. Admission is free but reservations are required. The film will be shown throughout the state this fall.

Patterns for American Womanhood: Magazines, Race, and Gender in 19th-century America

Wednesday, October 10 from 12:00 - 1:00 p.m., Fleming Museum, Burlington

This talk examines the role of women—as readers, authors, and editors—in making the magazine one of the most important sources that defined how to be a woman and an American. In the years before the Civil War, the magazine had helped white women redefine notions of femininity and to claim a right to help fashion American values. In the aftermath of the war and Reconstruction, black women turned to the magazine to further their project of Racial Uplift by providing models for black American womanhood.

Mercy Connections Women's Small Business Program - Getting Serious: Intro to Self-Employment

Intro to JavaScript with Girl Develop It Burlington

Mondays and Thursdays October 15 - 25 from 6:00 - 8:30 p.m., Champlain College, Burlington

JavaScript is the programming language used to add interactivity to websites. Ever used Google maps or Facebook? Clicked on a link or button that triggered a dialog box to appear? Seen a slideshow of images? JavaScript is the language that makes this type of interactive behavior possible! Start from the beginning, and by the end of the course, participants will have a knowledge of Javascript's syntax and fundamental concepts. Understand how Javascript is used to add interactivity to websites, Variables, Functions, Arrays, Loops, and Objects. Look at how Javascript can be used to modify the content, presentation and behavior of a website using event handlers and the DOM, or Document Object Model. Discuss what Javascript libraries are, for example the popular jQuery library, and how they can be leveraged to achieve complex functionality without writing lots of code from scratch. Course fee is \$100.

Addressing Unconscious Bias in the Workplace and Investing

Choosing Equity: Advancing Policies that Help All Kids Thrive


